

# Centenary of World War I

This year marks the centenary of the Armistice, when WWI hostilities ended. Our War Memorial was originally erected in the mid 1920's on a patch of land almost opposite the end of what is now Etchells Rd. In those days there was very little traffic. Over the years things changed and the site became unsuitable for a Remembrance Day service of any kind. In the 1990's Ratepayers' Councillor Ron Stenson campaigned to have the Memorial moved to a better location. This involved negotiations with the Royal British Legion, the War Graves Commission, and the Council to gain permissions and finance. Eventually he was successful, and in 2000, the Memorial and the carefully numbered stones were re-erected in their current fine location.

Remembrance Services organised by the Ratepayers have been held in the new location and since 2000, This has become a Heald Green tradition. At noon this Remembrance Sunday\*, we will once more take the opportunity to give thanks for the end of the hostilities, whilst paying our respects to the those who died in the service of our country. In the last couple of years, we became aware of a name which had been missed off the memorial for WW2. We went through the lengthy protocol and paid for this name to be added. We also gained permission and had a plaque added to the pillars to pay tribute to one of our sons of Heald Green who died in the Ballykelly bomb in Northern Ireland in 1986.

In 2014, to mark the anniversary of the start of WW1, we held a Vigil and dug a bed and planted flowers.



This year, to commemorate the centenary we are arranging to have extra large poppies fixed to lamp standards in Heald Green and Long Lane. We will make these poppies available for purchase by residents for front doors or cars and for local shops. We are also forming a Working Group to help plan the event. \*It was suggested that the Service should be at 11, but for various practical reasons it was decided to keep it at Noon.

# Seashell Trust Planning Application

Following the Council's refusal of planning permission for the Seashell Trust's application to rebuild their school and build 325 houses on the adjacent Greenbelt, the Trust has stated that they will appeal against the Council's decision. The appeal will take the form of a Public Inquiry , probably next year . We are working with the Action Group, which did much research on the application, preparing for the Public Inquiry on the Appeal.

# Greater Manchester Spatial Framework (GMSF)



## Comments please .....

With monies linked to the new road (A6MARR) construction, we are looking forward to some improvements in the pavements, crossings and signage along Finney Lane from the Library to the Railway Station. These improvements follow last year's public consultation and the work of our ward councillors liaising with the council's Highway department. However, since the consultation, an additional local proposal has come for a small paved area with a couple of park benches on the green space area in front of Café Unity. This new paved area would be made to look attractive with appropriate planting, but it may mean the removal of some or all of the existing beds. We would love to hear your views on this and invite you to contact any of our ward councillors to record your comments. We live in a very popular area! All talk of growth and prosperity puts Manchester airport, Stockport and North East Cheshire in the frame for residential and business growth. Whilst there are good reasons for the development of some well-placed new housing, there are also objections to mass house building and redevelopment, and you now have a chance to make your views known. The next draft of the Greater Manchester Spatial Framework comes out for public consultation this summer. We know that Heald Green is very likely to see new homes being built. What would you like to see happen? We have created an online form that will help us to know what you think. ## Your Say at the Election

In the run up to the local elections in May, we asked residents for their priorities and any comments or issues they wished to raise about living in Heald Green. We were pleased to receive more than 150 individual responses, categorised as seen below. This information will be used by both councillors and the Association to inform our future work and priorities.



Following a successful election campaign, we were delighted to see Adrian Nottingham returned as Councillor for Heald Green. Adrian took an impressive 59% share of the vote. This means that the Ratepayers' Association now has an 89-year unbroken record of providing councillors for Heald Green, the full election results were as follows:

We organise many events e.g. theatre visits, and film shows twice a year which are very popular and well attended. Plus ....Public consultation news: those taking place at present include the South East Manchester Multi-Modal Strategy and the Manchester Airport Draft Noise Action Plan 2019-2023. The councillors will be responding to represent the residents of Heald Green but individual submissions are also encouraged.

### **Traveller Incursions**

In June last year, a group of Travellers occupied East Avenue Park. The following day they moved to the Village Hall field, and did not leave until Saturday 8<sup>th</sup> July. Our Councillors were on scene within an hour and continuously pressed the Council and Police to act as quickly as legally possible to remove the Travellers.

CCTV at the Village Hall indicated that the Travellers had used a key. Although our councillors did not have a key, such keys are not uncommon, as Police and ambulances may need access. Some years ago, a man had a heart attack on the field. A Council officer has told us that last year a lady was taken ill on the field. The ambulance was unable to drive onto the field because they didn't have a key to open the barrier. In the end the lady had to be carried to the ambulance, which delayed treatment. The Council need to consider this carefully. However, to prevent locks being cut off, steel cowlings have since been fitted around them.

Also following on from some active lobbying by Cllr Nottingham, SMBC has redrafted the Council's protocol for dealing with traveller incursions, to improve the actions and timetable of the Council, Police and Courts. Ratepayers have also responded to a recent government consultation on the subject, calling for stronger laws.

On 17 June this year, travellers again attempted to access the field. They were unable to drive over the bund or undo the lock. The lock was a non-standard lock, so,at the moment, emergency services are unable to access the field.

### Train Pain

Councillors are working with other political groups at the Town Hall to continue to press Northern Rail to improve the service to Heald Green station which has been severely affected by the recent well-reported timetable changes. We are also concerned with the impact of reduced bus services and congestion on local roads!

# General Data Protection Regulation

You will be aware that the law on data protection has recently changed. Here are some points from our policy which appears in full on our website.

We only hold information that you give us. This may include: Your Name, Address, Telephone number and email address. We need to maintain a list of members, because they are the only ones eligible to vote at a General meeting.

We also have lists of volunteers willing to distribute CONTACT magazine, leaflets or to help us in other ways, for example to display Ratepayers' poster prior to the local election. We will never share your data with external organisations unless required to do so by law.
